# · CADCET ·

### Keep Calm and Carry On

You may use this card when you are designated by another player to move your playing piece. When it is used, such movement is exempted such that your playing piece remains stationary.

This card can be used once only.



# CADCET .

# Go Against the Tide

You may use this card when you are designated by another player to move your playing piece. When it is used, move your playing piece opposite to the instruction (i.e. N becomes S: E becomes W).

This card can be used once only.



# CADCET O

#### **Tit for Tat**

You may use this card when you are designated by another player to move your playing piece. When it is used, such movement is exempted from your playing piece but reapplies to the one of the designating player.

This card can be used once only.



# · CADCET ·

## **Unstoppable**

You may use this card when your playing piece lands on an obstacle. When it is used, the prohibition of drawing a game card in your next round is lifted.

This card can be used once only.




#### FORTUNE

You found a compass. You can move your playing piece to N, E, S or W at your choice by 1 square.







## FORTUNE

You found an opponent's secret place for hiding treasures. You can designate a player to give you one Gadget Card. If none of the other players have Gadget Cards, you can roll the dice once.



### MISFORTUNE

Your ship is stranded. Stay at where you are.



#### MISFORTUNE

You left something important behind.
Go back to the starting point.



#### MISFORTUNE

You lost all your Gadget Cards when you dozed off. Also, you are prohibited from drawing a card in your next round.



# HOW TO PLAYS

- Place the four playing pieces at the four starting points (i.e. the four squares bearing pirate characters) respectively. Each player chooses a playing piece to represent himself/herself. Reduce the number of playing pieces according to the number of players.
- 2 Players take turns to draw a game card.
- 3 When it is your turn, draw a game card and read it out except when the card drawn is a Gadget Card.
  - a. Fortune Card or Misfortune Card Follow its instructions.
  - b. **Gadget Card** Show the title "Gadget Card" to other players without displaying the instructions thereon, and keep the card for later use.
  - c. Quiz Card Roll the dice once if you answer the question correctly.

    No action is required if you answer it wrong.

- After rolling the dice, move your playing piece according to the dice face:
  - a. If you get N, E, S or W, you may choose to keep your playing piece stationary, but designate another player to move his/her playing piece according to the dice face.
  - b. If the movement of a playing piece will cause it crashing into another playing piece or going beyond the game board, let the playing piece remain stationary.
  - c. If your playing piece lands on an obstacle (i.e. a square bearing water mines, a tornado, a giant octopus or a shipwreck), you will be prohibited from drawing a game card in the next round.
- 6 After completing the above actions, the next player draws a game card and so on.
- **6** The player whose playing piece enters one of the four squares at the centre of the game board first wins.
